State Engineer Selects New Water Resource Specialist

(SANTA FE, New Mexico) – New Mexico State Engineer John D’ Antonio has appointed a new water resource specialist to join the agency’s Interstate Stream Commission Office in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

David Green began his position on February 16. Prior to joining the agency, he was a field science technician with Parsons Engineering and Science in Albuquerque from 2002 to 2004. From 1994 to 2004, he was involved in casework with the Association for Retarded Citizens of Albuquerque.

In 2003, Green completed a bachelor of science degree in environmental science and a bachelor of arts degree in chemistry from the University of New Mexico.

“Green’s work with the Interstate Stream Commission will focus on data collection, management, and analysis of issues on the Lower Rio Grande Project,” said State Engineer D’Antonio.

The Office of the State Engineer is charged with administering the state's water resources. The State Engineer has power over the supervision, measurement, appropriation, and distribution of all surface and groundwater in New Mexico, including streams and rivers that cross state boundaries. The State Engineer is also Secretary of the Interstate Stream Commission and oversees its staff.
