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Protecting New Mexico's Water in the Lower Rio Grande: Grant Application Deadline Extended

(LAS CRUCES, New Mexico) – The New Mexico Interstate Stream Commission (NMISC) is extending the grant application deadline period for members of the agricultural community interested in participating in the **2020–2023 Groundwater Conservation Pilot Program (Program) for the Lower Rio Grande.**

The grant applications will be accepted again between October 4 – 22, 2021.

Successful applicants will receive grant funding to temporarily stop the use of groundwater for an 18-month period beginning January 1, 2022. This extension follows the application period for 2022-2023 that ran between August 9 – 23, 2021.

The New Mexico State Legislature appropriated \$7 million in 2020 to the NMISC to develop and fund a Water Management Pilot Project for the Lower Rio Grande for fiscal years 2020 through 2023.

During 2021, conservation grants were provided to compensate irrigators for temporarily conserving groundwater by not irrigating previously irrigated parcels. During this period, a total of 24 grant agreements were awarded to participants, encompassing 1,272 acres for a total of \$865,000 in grant payments. Currently, 29 applications are under review from the August application period encompassing a total of 2,055 acres.

Groundwater irrigated parcel(s) are eligible for participation in the Program, if:

(1) The irrigated acreage within the parcel is at least 10 acres in size.

- Partial parcels are acceptable, provided the 10-acre minimum groundwater irrigated acreage requirement is met.
- Multiple parcels are allowed so long as the total contiguous groundwater irrigated acreage meets the 10-acre minimum requirement.

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- (2) The acreage has been irrigated with groundwater only, or a combination of groundwater and surface water, for at least four years out of the five years between 2016 and 2020.
- (3) The water rights associated with the acreage is in good standing with the New Mexico Office of the State Engineer (NMOSE) Water Rights Division.
- (4) Other due diligence contingencies determined by the NMISC are satisfied.

The Office of the State Engineer is charged with the administering the state's water resources. The State Engineer has power over the supervision, measurement, appropriation, and distribution of all surface and groundwater in New Mexico, including streams and rivers that cross state boundaries. The State Engineer is also Secretary of the Interstate Stream Commission.

The nine-member Interstate Stream Commission is charged with separate duties including protecting New Mexico's right to water under eight interstate stream compacts, ensuring the state complies with each of those compacts as well as investigating, conserving and protecting the waters of the State, in addition to water planning.

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
